To get my body ready for my MRI, I will not eat or drink anything the morning I come to the hospital.

To see how much I weigh, I will stand on a scale.








Then, they will bring us to another room.



I will get a bracelet with my name and birthday on it.




I may change into hospital pajamas.





Someone will check my temperature with a wand that touches my forehead.






They will also check my blood pressure using a sleeve that gives my arm a hug.



To check my heart, lungs, and belly, they will use a stethoscope. They will ask me to take deep breaths.










When it's time for my MRI, I will say "see you soon" to my grown-ups. Then, I will go to the MRI room.





This is the MRI camera. It looks like a giant donut.

I will lay on the MRI table. The MRI camera won't touch my body.



Then, I will get cool air to breathe through a mask. I can still talk and laugh with this mask. I will start to feel sleepy.






When my MRI is done, I will wake up in a new room. My grown-ups will be there when I wake up.













## \*If the Anesthesiologist says your child needs an IV before they fall asleep, please see the steps below for IV placement preparation.

## step 1

My body may need medicine in my arm. I will get this medicine through a little bendy medicine straw called an IV.





at my arm to find the right spot for the straw.



They will use a rubber band to give my arm a squeeze. Then, they will use a





sponge to clean my arm.



There will be a quick poke to get the straw in the right place. The poke will come out and the straw will stay to give my body medicine.



A sticker will help the medicine straw stay in the right place. Medicine tubes will attach to the medicine straw like legos to give my body medicine.
